Advanced Placement and Honors Program

- Honors classes have the same course standards as on-level classes but are tailored for highachieving students — covering additional topics and/or some topics in greater depth.
- AP courses Cover the breadth of information, skills and assignments found in corresponding college courses.
- AP classes are more challenging than honors or on-level classes. They involve deeper concentration, more time and energy, and students must meet higher expectations.

Who Can Take AP and Honors Courses?

- AP and/or Honors courses are the right choice for you if you are motivated to work hard, and if you enjoy an academic challenge.
- Teachers make recommendations based on academic performance each year.
- Parents and students are encouraged to discuss these recommendations with their teachers.

The Benefits of AP classes?

- Students have the opportunity to earn college credit by taking the related AP exam.
- Help develop college-level academic skills.
- Save money on tuition and possibly graduate from college sooner.
- Impress college admissions officers by showing you are ready for college-level coursework.
- Strengthen your transcript and increase your chances for scholarships.
- AP classes can boost your GPA and strengthen your college application.

Should I take AP Courses?

- High-achieving Freshmen and Sophomores may take select AP courses, but the selection is limited.
- Juniors and Seniors have access to many more AP courses, but they should not choose more than they can adequately manage.
- AP Potential uses PSAT data to identify students who are likely to score a 3 or higher on a specific AP exam. These results can help students determine which AP classes are a good fit.

When are AP Exams?

- All AP Exams are given the first two weeks of May. They typically last 3 hours and include three possible types of questions or tasks: multiple-choice questions, free-response questions, and course performance tasks. Most AP Exams are a mix of multiple-choice and freeresponse questions.

Cost of AP Exams

- The exam fee for 2025 is \$114 for the first exam (includes a \$15 administration fee) and \$99 for each additional exam.
- One (1) AP STEM exam is covered by the state (Math, Science, and Computer Science A).
- All exams are covered for students in the free/reduced lunch program (excluding the \$15 administration fee).

AP Exam Grading System

- AP Exams are scored using a five-point scale.
- Students who do well on the exams may become eligible to receive credit or placement in college.
 - Most colleges require at least a 3 or higher to receive credit.

College Board AP Credit Search



Quality Points for Honors Courses

- Honors courses offer a more rigorous curriculum.
- Students do not earn college credit in honors courses.
- Students earn a 0.5 quality point towards the Cobb County School District weighted GPA.
- HOPE does not award quality points for Honors Level courses.

Quality Points for AP Courses

- AP courses and World Language courses from level IV and higher receive 1.0 additional quality points in the Cobb County School District.
- The HOPE Scholarship awards a 0.5 additional quality point up to 4.0.

- Completion of all English language arts requirements for graduation with an overall grade point average of 3.0 or above in those classes.
- Proficiency in **one or more languages other than English,** demonstrated by:
 - passing a foreign language advanced placement examination with a score of 4 or higher
 - passing an international baccalaureate examination with a score of 5 or higher
 - for languages in which an advanced placement examination is not available, check with your school World Language Department for approved Georgia Department of Education approved examinations.

World Languages Classes:

Completion of at least three credits in the same world language and/or ESOL

International Focus:

- At least four credits in courses determined to have an international focus ex) international economics, world/non-US history, world geography, etc.
- At least four extracurricular activities and/or experiences with global themes and/or in global contexts ex) exchange programs, international and language clubs, travel abroad
- 20 hours of community service involving a global/cross-cultural public service project
- **Capstone presentation** Student presents on the knowledge gained in the courses & activities listed above.

WHAT IS WORK BASED LEARNING?

WBL is a course that enables students to participate in a mentorsupervised, on the job training experience for career awareness and exploration. Students select a specific career field or industry's entry level job in which to participate. The Work-Based Programs Coordinator visits the job mentor to assess student performance and supervises the student in skill development. The student will maintain a portfolio containing records of weekly hours on the job, completed program participation forms and other required materials. Student may be placed in a paid or non-paid, mentor-supervised, on-the-job training experience.



STUDENT REQUIREMENTS

- Be on track to graduate (Junior or Senior)
- ✓ 2.50 GPA or higher
- Current employed or seeking a paid or non-paid internship (must have placement by time school begins in August)
- V Placement must be relevant to career interests and course work (can include career courses, JROTC and AP classes)
 v Must have transportation to and
 - from work site
- Students also need to fit into the Work Based Learning Interlocking Components:
 - 1. Create a career goal
 - 2. Complete course work in AP, career or fine arts classes that relate to career goal
 - Obtain a placement that connects back to goal and coursework

Work Based Learning and AP

- WBL offers AP students a unique opportunity to earn academic elective credit.
- Must line up on the WBL Triangle:
 - Example 1: AP Social Studies student, plans to major in history/pre-law at UGA, paid internship at a law office
 - This student will receive a social study credit for WBL
 - Example 2: AP Science student, plans to attend to college to be a vet, unpaid internship at a veterinary office
 - This student will receive science elective credit for WBL
 - WBL credit for both student counts towards HOPE Scholarship GPA

Registration

- Teachers will make core course recommendations for 9th grade.
- In the future teachers will continue to make recommendations for the following year.
- Verification is done at the start of each semester.

Changes to Course Requests

- Parents have an opportunity to change their child's course recommendation using the Course Verification Form (mailed early April)
- Course request changes must be completed within the specified time period.
- Course requests will be finalized in May and changes will only be made if there is an error in scheduling.


Advantages/Expectations
