Exam Formats



- Exam duration: 2-3 hours
- Most exams are broken into two parts
 - Part One
 - Multiple choice section
 - Students will choose 1 answer from 4-5 answer choices for each question
 - Total exam score on this section is based only on the number of questions answered correctly
 - Don't lose points for incorrect or unanswered questions
 - Part Two
 - Free response section
 - Consists of free-response questions that require you to generate your own responses Depending on the exam, responses could be in essay format, a solution to a problem or a spoken response

Digital/Hybrid Exams



• Many exams are moving towards full digital/hybrid exam administration in the Spring of 2025.

- On testing day you should bring with you:
 - Your fully charged device with Bluebook already installed. Your device should be able to hold a charge for 4 hours.
 - Your device's power cord and/or a portable charger.
 Note: You might not have access to an outlet during testing.
 - A pencil and blue/black pen.

 Scratch paper will be provided—do not bring your own.
 - An external mouse if you use one.







After the AP Exams are administered, schools return any paper AP Exam materials to the AP Program.

Then, for most AP courses:

- The multiple-choice section is scored by computer.
- The free-response section (essays and open-ended questions) and through-course performance tasks are scored at the annual AP Reading held during the first two weeks in June. Specially appointed college professors and experienced AP teachers score this section of the exam.
- The total scores from the free-response section and the multiple-choice section are combined to form a composite score.

These composite scores are then translated into the 5-point scale using statistical processes.

Score Report Timeline



- AP Scores are sent to students and colleges around the first week of July.
- Students can choose (at the time of testing) which college to automatically send scores to.

AP Fees & Exam Costs



- College Board charges a one-time annual fee of \$15 for exams.
 - These fees are used to:
 - develop, print, ship, and score the exams
 - subsidize teacher training
 - develop classroom resources
 - support educational initiatives
- Each exam costs \$99*
- Georgia pays for one STEM exam annually.
 This includes AP Biology, AP Chemistry, AP Physics, AP Environmental Science, AP Precalculus, AP Calculus, AP Statistics, and AP Computer Science A

*MyPaymentsPlus automatically calculates costs including discounted costs for reduced lunch.



AP & College Success



Students who take AP courses and exams are much more likely than their peers to complete a bachelor's degree in four years or less.



Why take the A.P. Exam?



Most of the nation's colleges and universities, plus colleges and universities in 24 other countries, grant students admission, credit, and/or placement for qualifying AP Exam grades.

For example, at Princeton, students can use qualifying AP Exam grades to:

- Graduate in three or three-and-a-half years
- Enter upper-level courses
- Fulfill a foreign language requirement
- If you qualify for college credit with a score your university will accept, you will not take a college composition course. (Comp 1101). You will still need to take the literature course (Literature 1102).







A.P. Scholar Awards



AP Scholar

Granted to students who receive grades of 3 or higher on 3 or more exams

AP Scholar with Honors

• Granted to students with an average grade of at least 3.24 on all AP exams taken, and grades of 3 or higher on 4 or more of these exams

AP Scholar with Distinction

• Granted to students who receive an average grade of at least 3.5 on all AP exams taken, and grades of 3 or higher on 5 or more of these exams



What should be happening at home?



Studying and preparing for an AP course and exam looks different than it does for other courses.

If you don't practice, or do your own work, or miss class, or don't study, or don't come to tutoring, or don't put more than basic levels of effort into class, don't expect higher than a 2 on the test. You may get a B in the class, but you will probably get a 2 on the test. It's just the truth, and it's also a college level class.

- Daily studying
- Parallel Reading
- Study Groups (not plagiarism groups)
- Individual Research and On-Line practice
- "Above and beyond the graded work"
