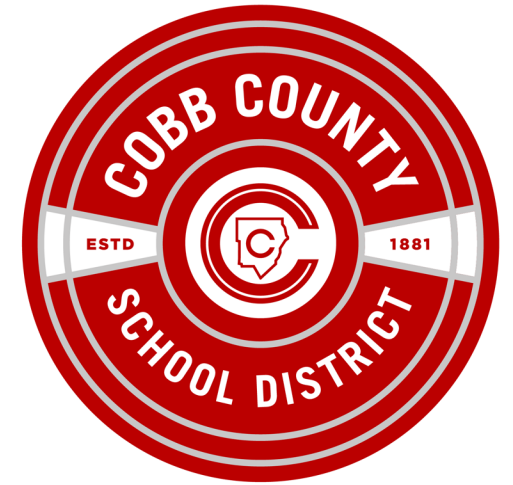

ENROLLMENT STUDY

Annual Update Methodology

A wide array of data, from multiple sources, was used to highlight and identify trends that assist school districts in making data-based decisions: including teaching allotments, building utilization, SPLOST initiatives, and attendance zone boundary creation and modification.

Cohort-Based Growth Forecasting

Growth forecasts are developed using a cohort-based approach, identifying enrollment trends in conjunction with census data and residential and commercial development patterns across Cobb County.

GIS-Enabled Spatial Analysis

Geographic Information Systems (GIS) align multiple growth components — including land purchases, zoning applications, new residential permits, and national parcel data — to yield a precise picture of future facility needs.

Multiple Data Sources

Major sources include the U.S. Census Bureau, Dept of Housing and Urban Development, Georgia DOE, Georgia Department of Health, the Governor's Office of Planning and Budget, Atlanta Regional Commission (ARC), and local governments.

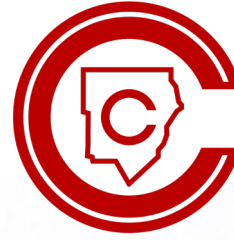


EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Enrollment Study Annual Update identifies Trends and Indicators that are likely to affect future student enrollment . Data is used to determine facility adjustments that may be needed to accommodate student enrollment either by attendance boundary modification, additional classrooms and/or modernization of existing schools, and to also identify when and where new schools are needed.

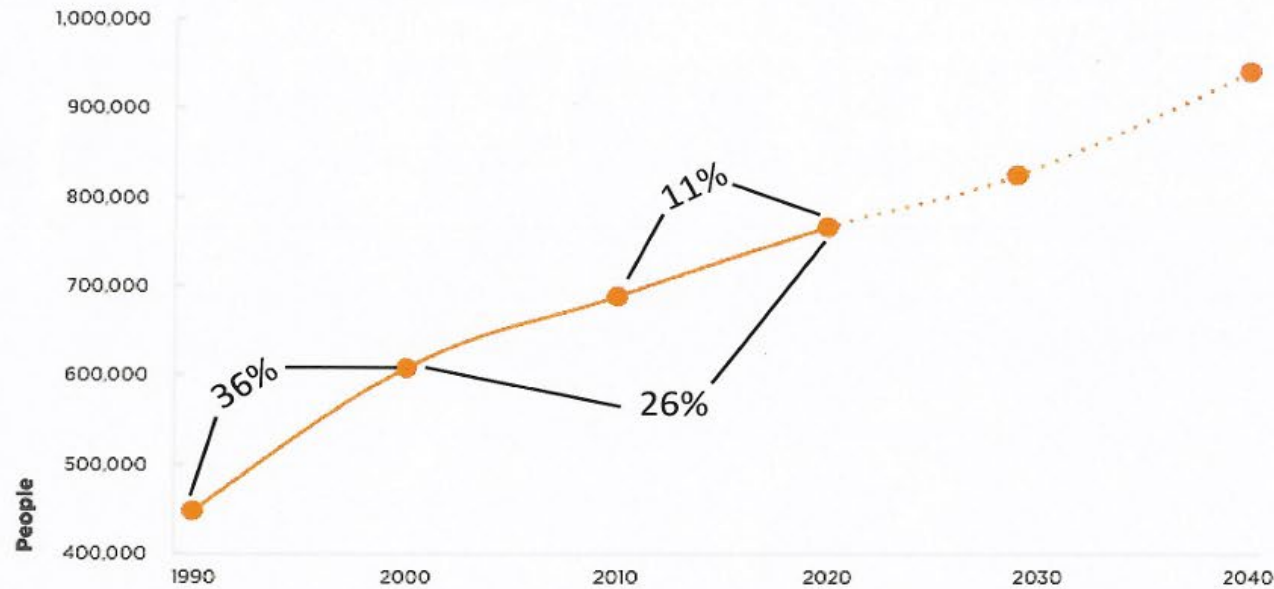
Evaluation of live birth rates prepare the school district for incoming Kindergarten classes and student mobility. Housing and parcel data are studied continuously to monitor single-family and multi-family developments as they are planned.

This enrollment study continues with the previous 5-year and 10-year projections and will make adjustments accordingly as population estimates are adjusted at the state and national level. This annual process to continuously study all Trends and Indicators allows the district to make data-driven decisions and to be fiscally responsible with SPLOST projects.

According to the most recent Census data release, Cobb grew by 6,300 people, a percent change of +0.81%, primarily driven by immigration. In the decade between 2014 and 2024, Cobb County's population grew by 8.2%

Student Yield Factor: Live Births

Kindergarten Pipeline

Children typically enter kindergarten 5–6 years after birth, making birth data the district's most reliable leading indicator for K–2 enrollment planning.

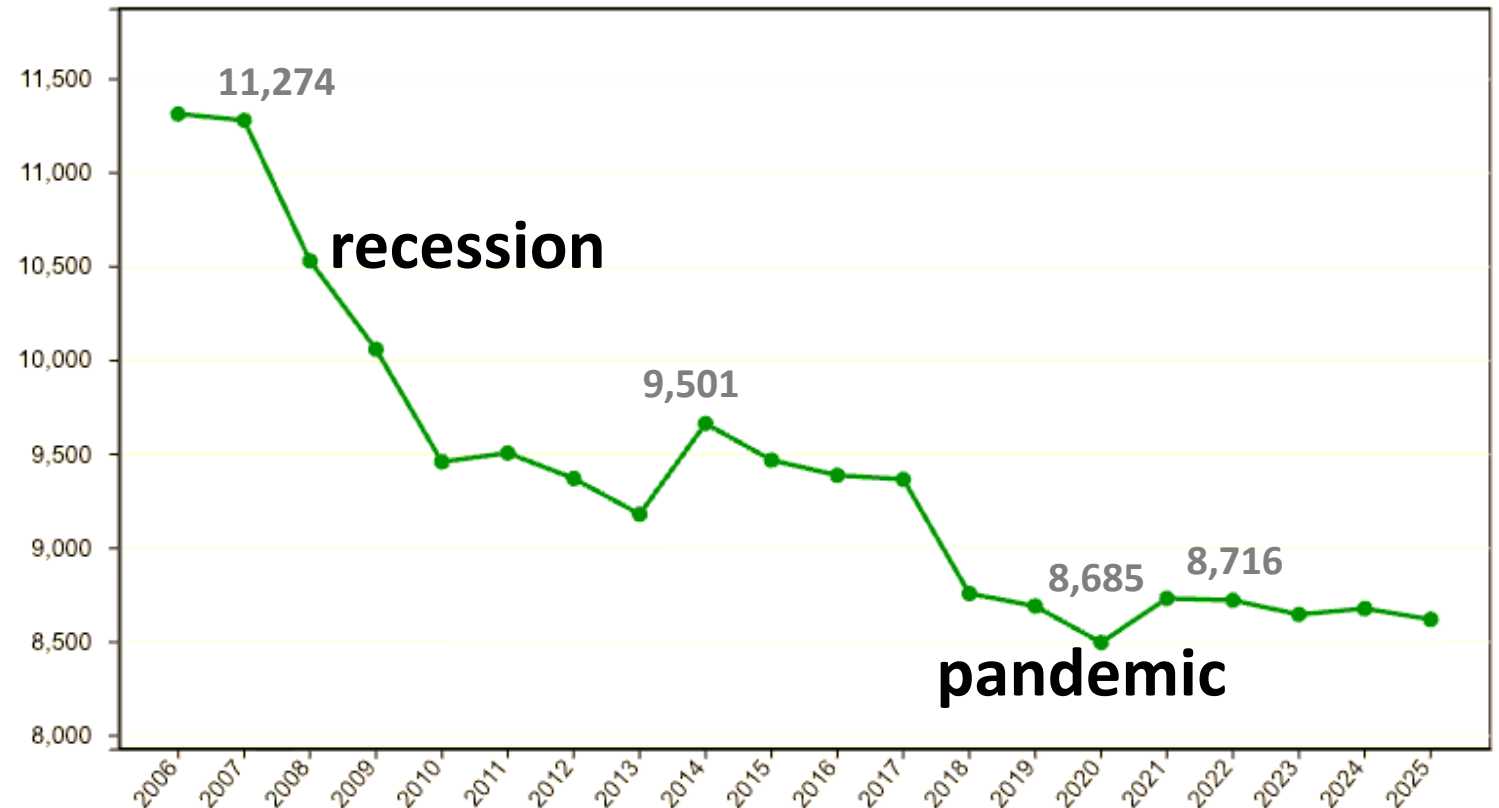
Post-2020 Recovery

Live births dipped in 2020 during the pandemic but rebounded by 2022, projecting a modest uptick in kindergarten cohorts entering schools 2027–2028.

Long-Term Stability

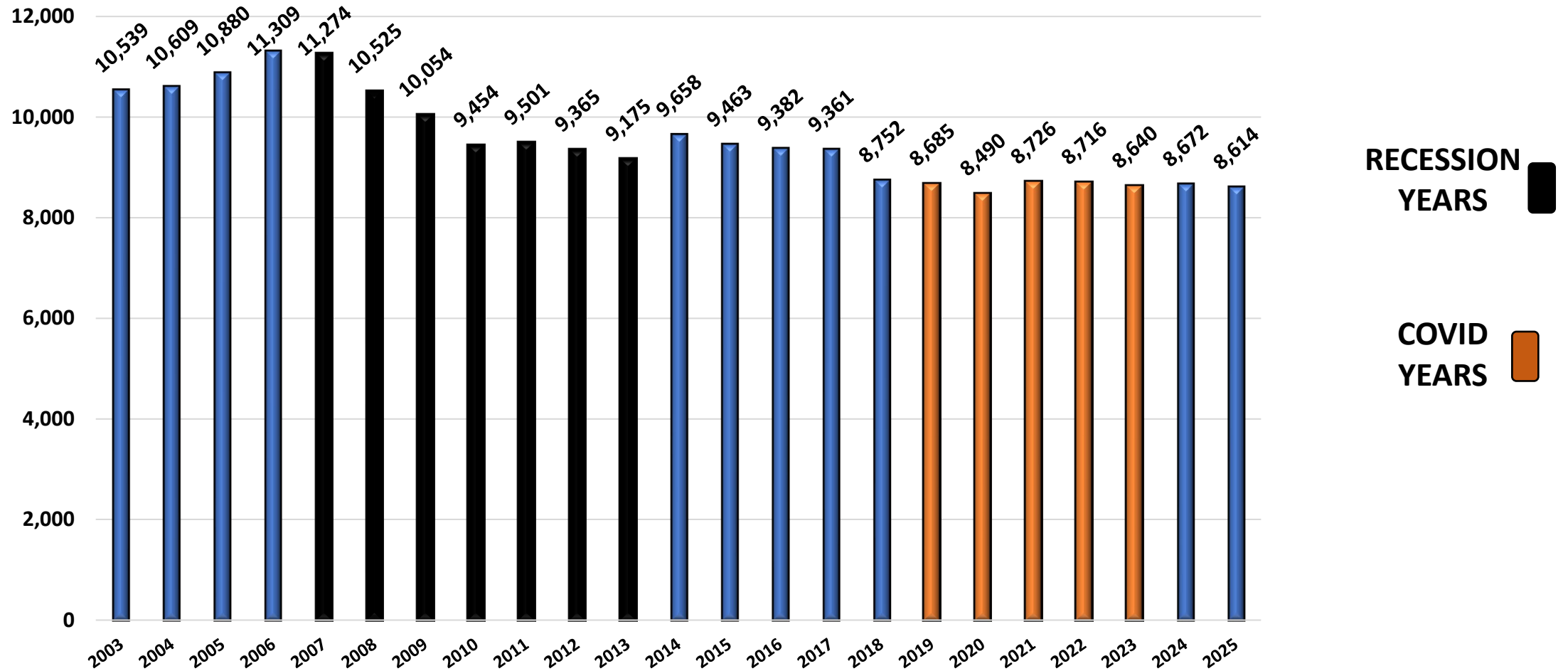
Post-Recession, Cobb County has maintained a relatively stable birth rate, supporting consistent long-term enrollment forecasting for elementary planning.

Live Births in Cobb County: 2008–2025



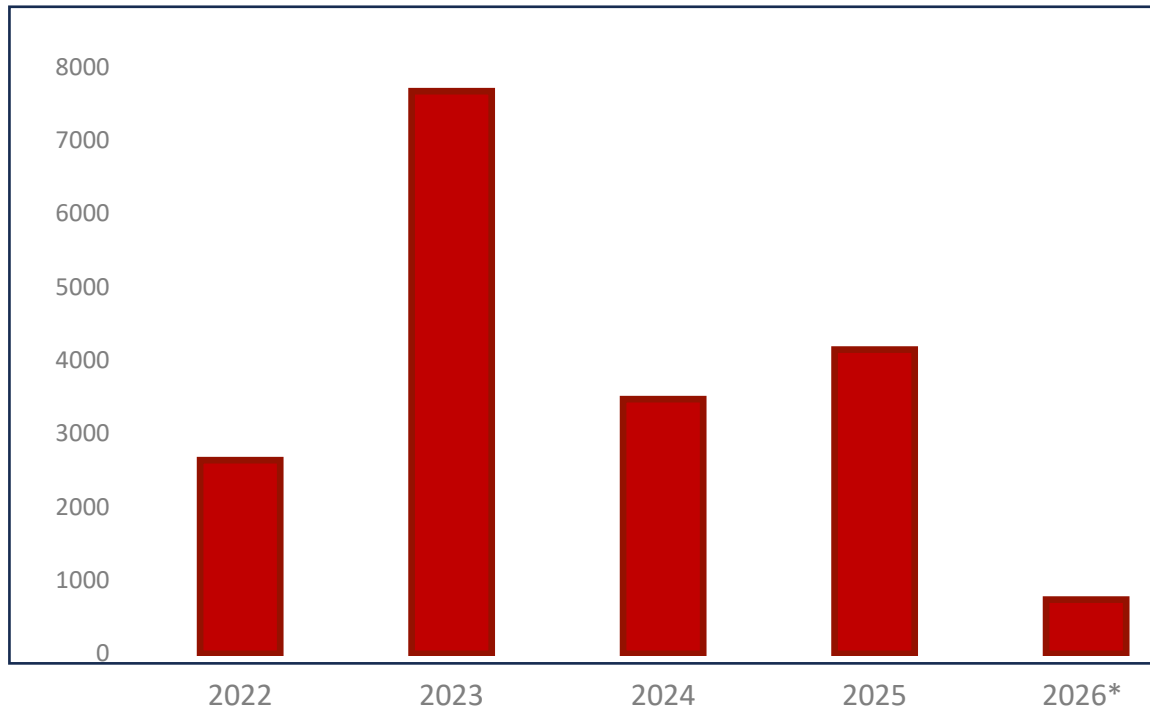

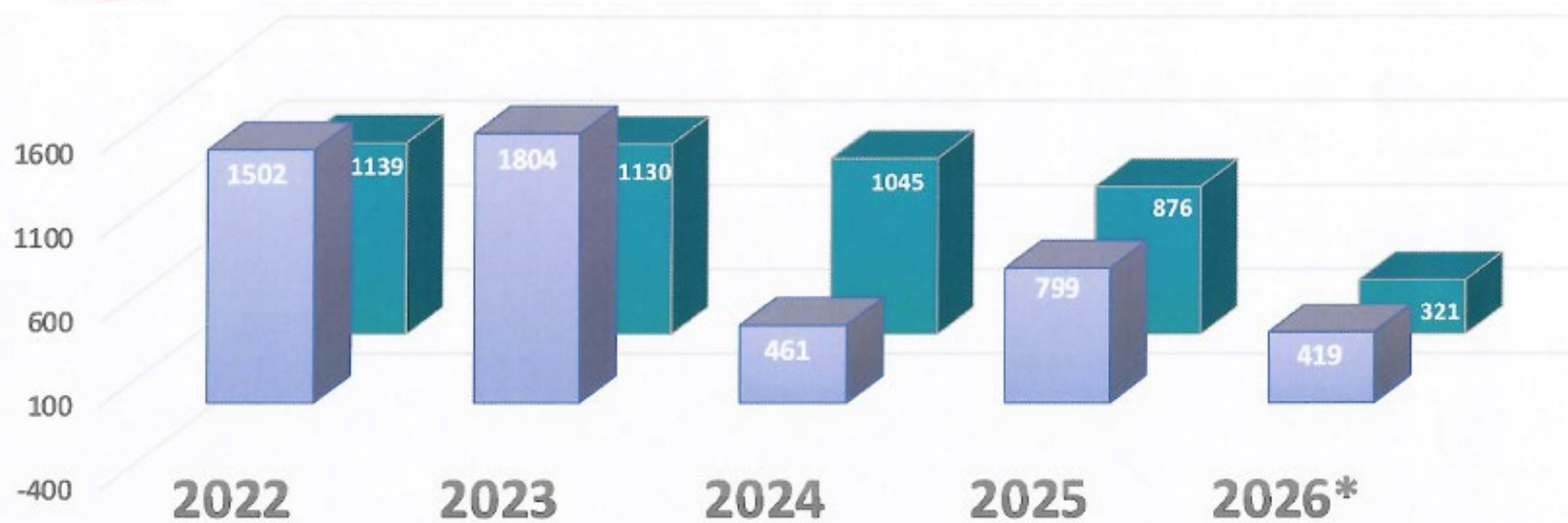

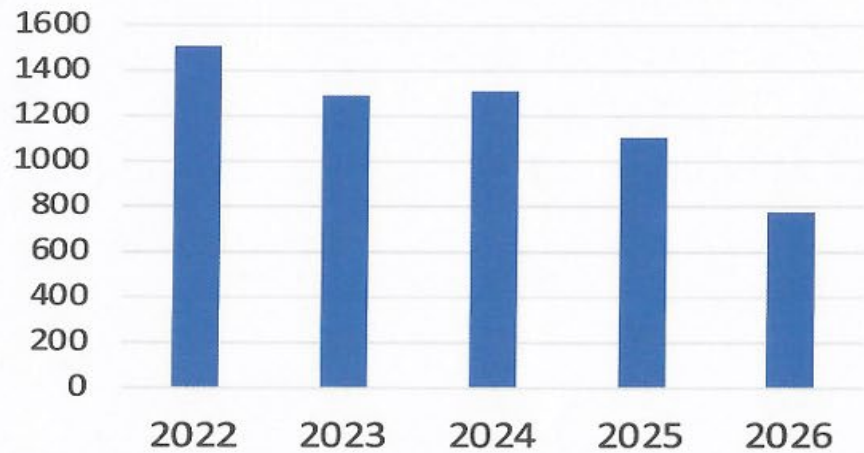


Student Yield Factor: Building Permits

- New housing permits - especially Single Family - correlate with future student enrollment in the 2–5 years following permit issuance.

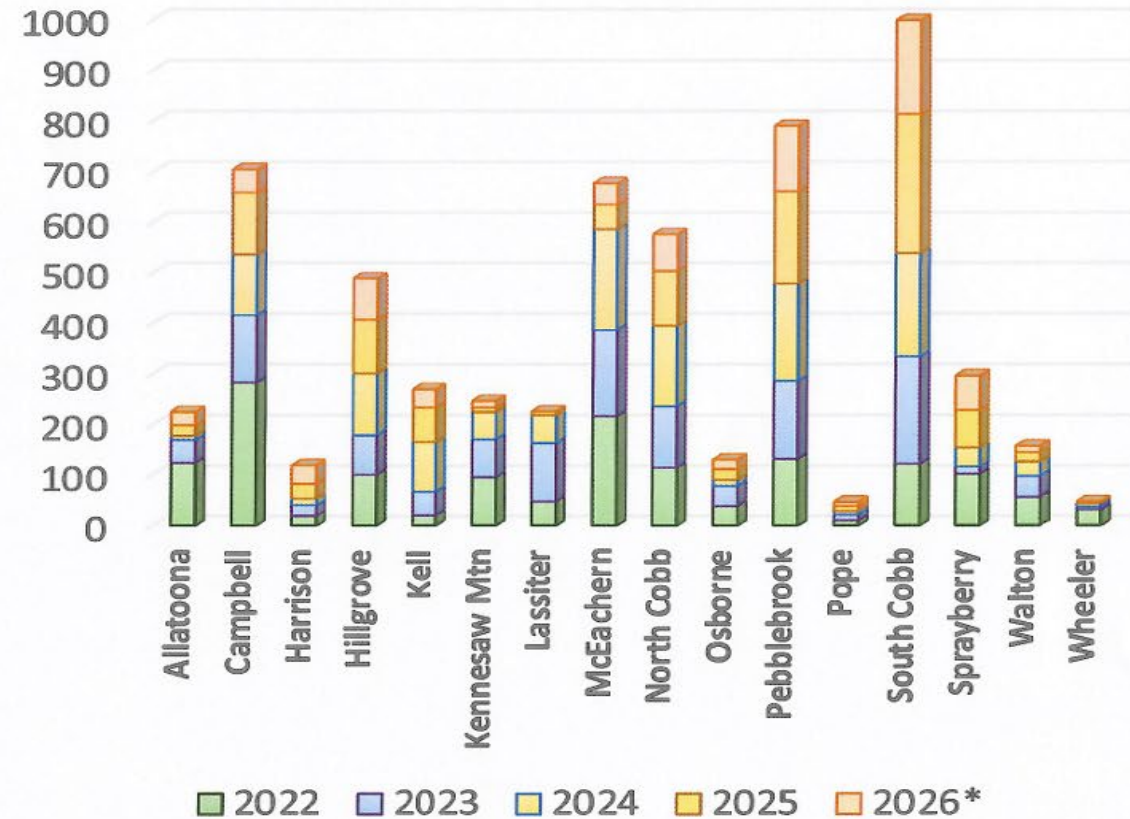

New Home Sales Cobb County School District



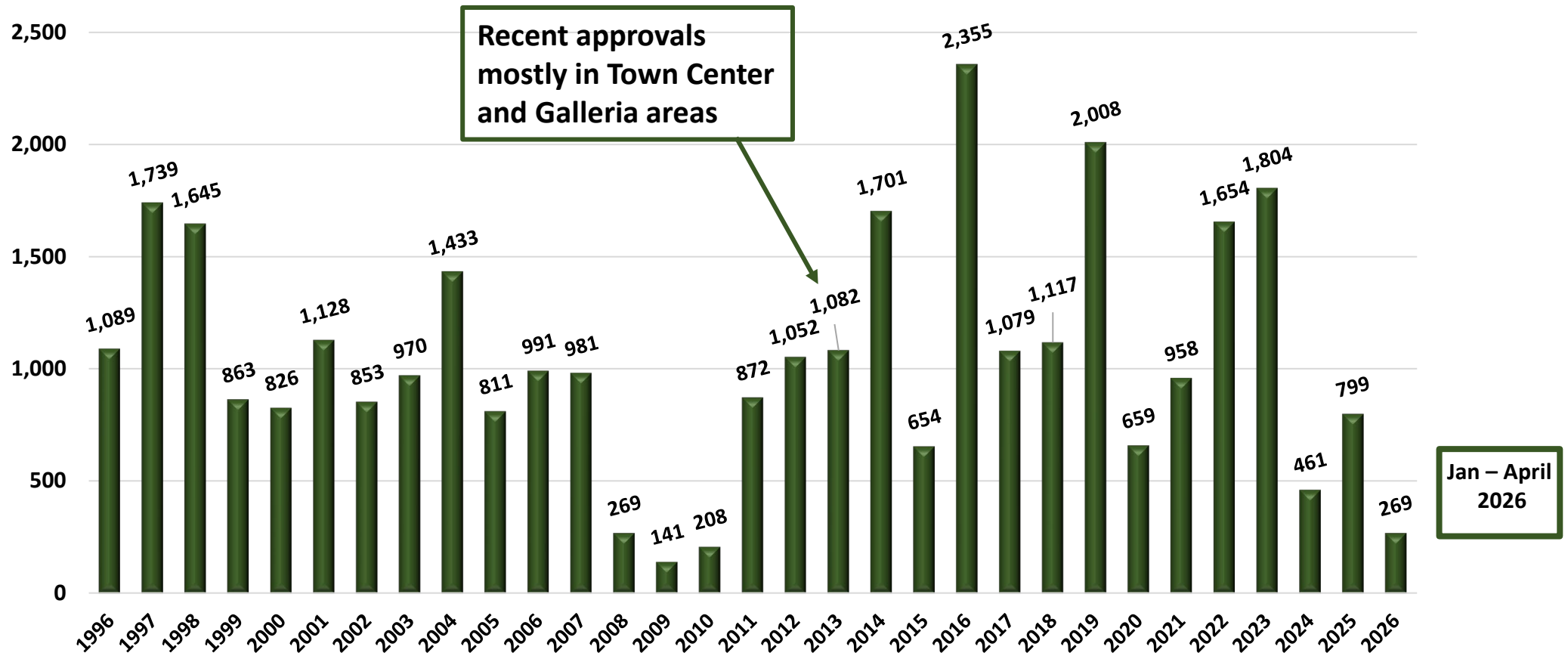

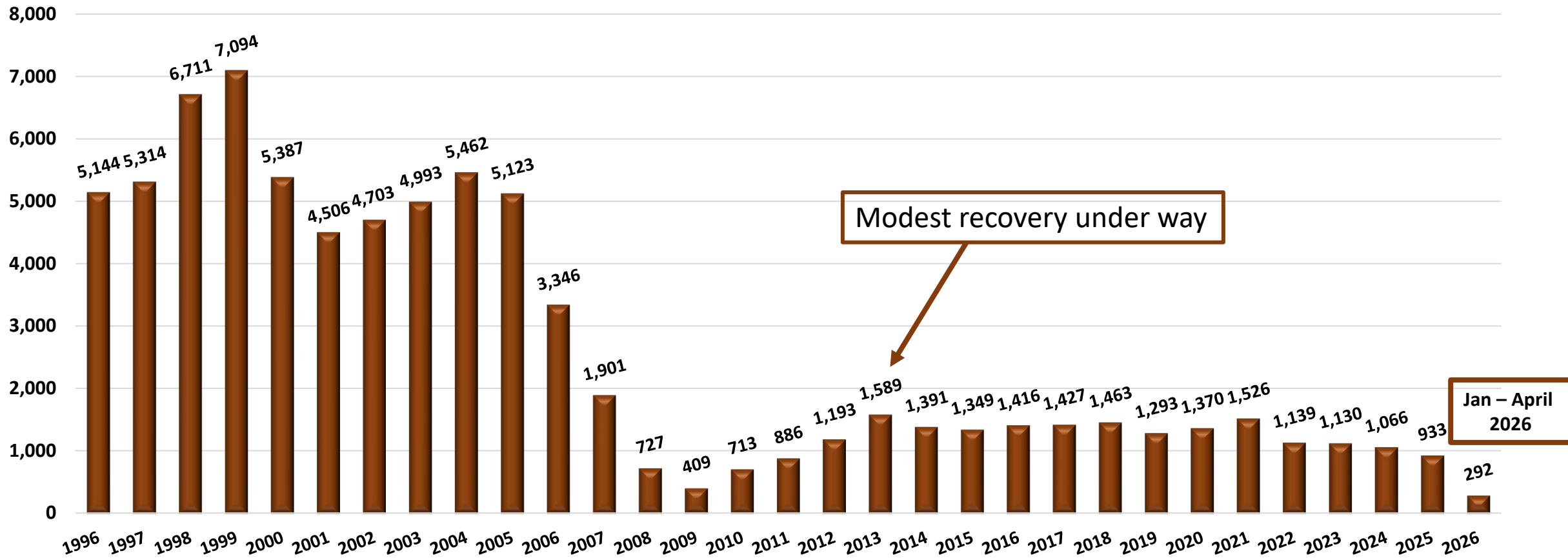
MULTI-FAMILY BUILDING PERMITS IN COBB 1996 – 2026 (Excluding Marietta)

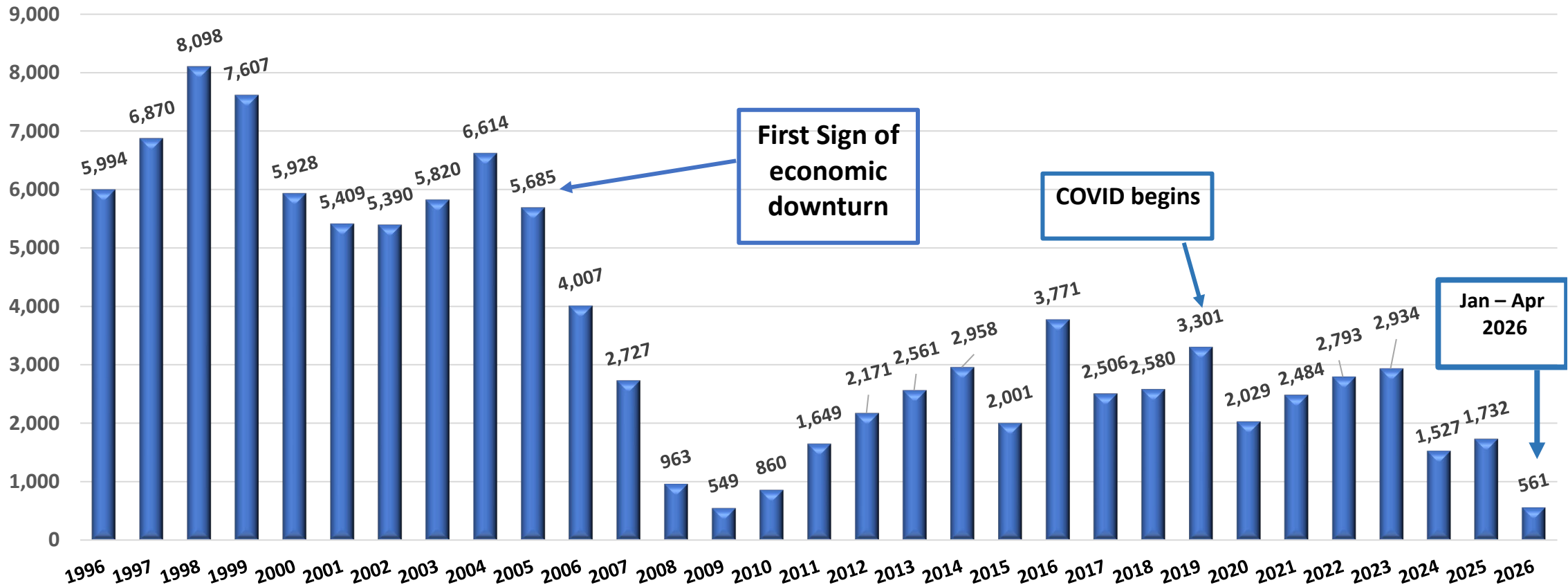
SINGLE-FAMILY BUILDING PERMITS IN COBB 1996 – 2026 (Excluding Marietta)

TOTAL BUILDING PERMITS APPROVED IN COBB 1996-2026 (Excluding Marietta)

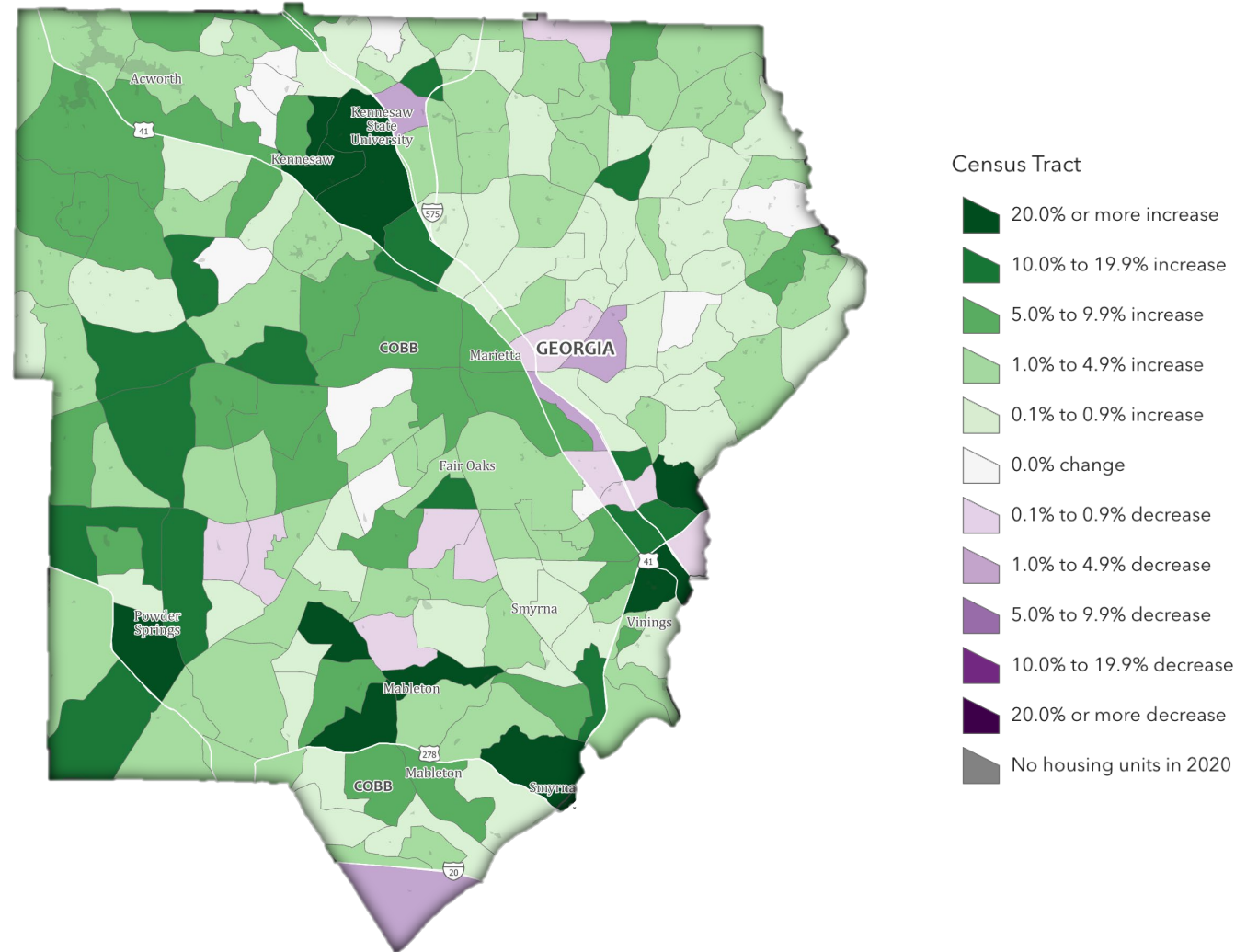

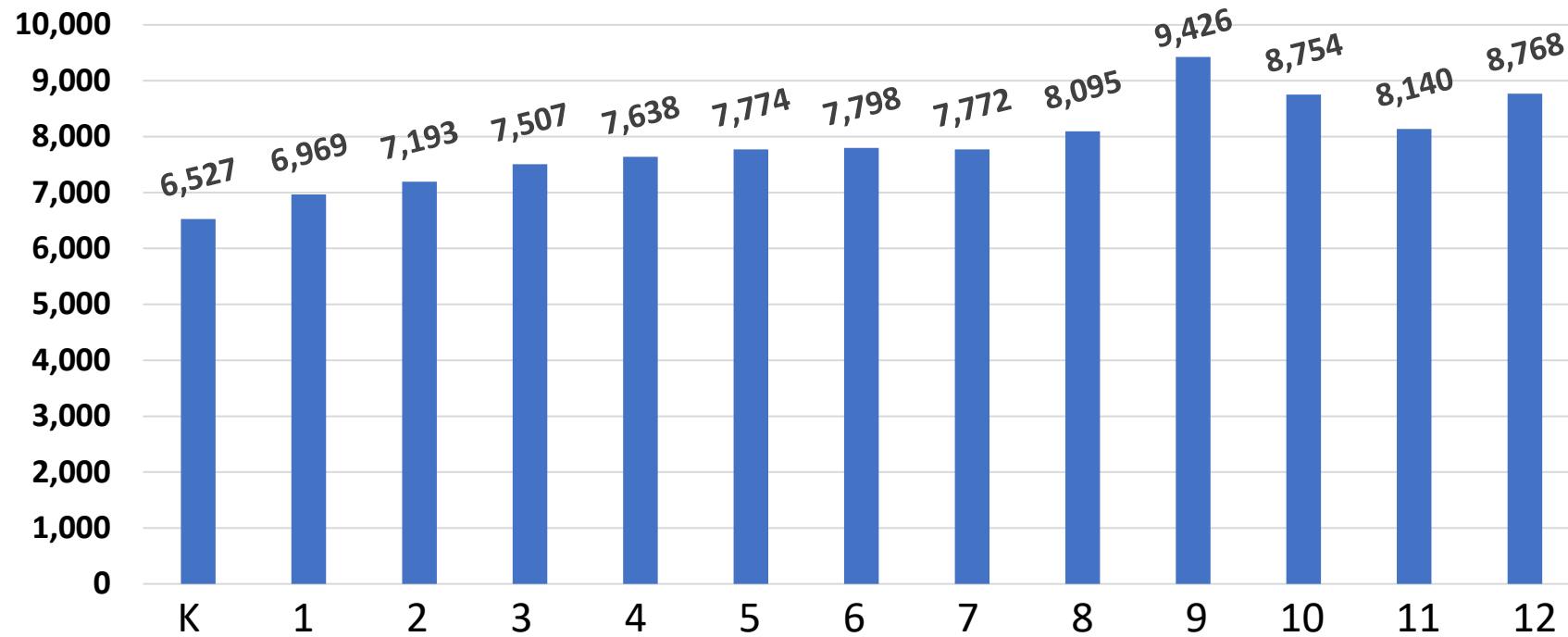

Elementary Schools Facility Analysis

The student capacity of our schools has been established using the state formula provided by the Georgia Department of Education Facilities Unit.

This analysis considered various factors influencing classroom usage. Every one of the sixty-six Elementary Schools received a review to determine usage of classroom spaces. Seventeen schools were fully utilized for instructional purposes, while thirty-six schools operated at 90-99% capacity, and thirteen schools had an instructional utilization rate between 77-89%.

Classroom usage encompasses regular education instruction as well as specialized programs such as Early Intervention, Special Education, ESOL, Gifted, and Remedial Programs, which have state-mandated class sizes significantly smaller than the general classroom size, thereby reducing the overall student capacity of the school.

Classroom Countdown: The Enrollment Shift Shaping Atlanta's Future

The Atlanta Regional Commission (ARC) represents the 11-county Metro Atlanta area. Along with many other functions, they have recently reviewed and provided some forecasting of school student enrollments. Most of the 15 school districts have seen dramatic growth over the past number of years.

One way to anticipate future trends is to compare the number of students entering the pipeline as kindergarteners with the number of students exiting as 12th graders. Twelve of the fifteen school systems serving the 11-county region are currently showing a slow down or stop in growth.

The aging population and declining birth rates are a trend not unique to the Atlanta area, but representative of a nationwide trend.

The plan for future student population changes. Using multiple factors and historical student data combined with the latest demographic data and planned residential development information, we are able to calculate five-year and ten – year student population projections.

The factors to consider:

- HB 251 School Choice
- Children of Employees (State law 20-2-293)
- McKinney Vento Act (Federal Homeless Education Law)
- Pre-K numbers
- Home Schools Students
- Private School Students

These projections are based on the residence of students, not necessarily school enrollment and better assist the district where student population shifts will occur. Research and data are based on geographic reference and figures reflect the calculation of study areas within the Cobb County School District.
