CVA French 1 Syllabus

Class Description



The French 1 class explores the cultures of France, Canada, and other

French-speaking regions around the world. In this beginning level class, students will learn the foundations of French grammar and vocabulary necessary to build fluent language proficiency and will apply their new knowledge through culturally relevant writing, listening, and speaking exercises. It assumes that the students have minimal or no prior knowledge of the language and culture. An important component of language classes is the use of the language beyond the classroom in the real world. The integration of technology is an important tool in accessing authentic information in the target language and in providing students the opportunity to interact with native speakers. This class requires active participation.

This course has three sections: Section A is the first half of the class and includes Units 1-3. Section B is the second half of the class and includes Units 4-6. Section Y is the entire class and includes Units 1-6.

Class Outline

Unit 1: Ma vie!

Students will learn about greetings, nationalities, French geography, and notable figures in French culture. They'll practice language skills related to introductions, descriptions, and facts about France.

Unit 2: Mon école!

Students will learn about the French school system, including school classes, supplies, extracurricular activities, and clothing. They'll practice using verbs like "avoir" (to have), definite articles (le, la, l'), indefinite articles (un/une), and numbers to describe school schedules and discuss fashion.

Unit 3: Mes préférences!

Students will learn about food and drinks, cafeterias in different French-speaking countries, traditional Belgian food, tableware etiquette, and meal courses at restaurants. They'll practice using various verb conjugations (-er, -ir), definite articles, idiomatic expressions, and the negative form.

Unit 4: Ma famille!

Students will learn about family members, nicknames, the importance of pets, possessive adjectives, and the preposition "de" for possession. They'll also explore various titles for family members, cultural practices related to formal and informal usage, and use the verb "être." Additionally, they'll describe

famous people in Switzerland, information about Switzerland, use adjectives, question words, and discuss francophone birthday celebrations using numbers 70–100 and irregular adjectives.

Unit 5: Ma maison!

Students will learn about housing in city and countryside settings across Europe. They'll practice using expressions like "il y a" (there is/are) and distinguish questions from statements using intonation. Additionally, they'll describe specific places, such as the Palace of Versailles and the Palace of Monaco, using prepositions of location and contractions with "de" and "à." Furthermore, they'll explore kitchen and living room activities, discuss the metric system and euros, learn about the royal family of Monaco, use "aimer" (to like) with action verbs, and employ expressions with "faire." Lastly, they'll delve into the influence of francophone architects, use stem-changing verbs, and employ the verb "jouer" (to play) with prepositions.

Unit 6: Ma ville!

Students will learn how to use friendly community greetings, discuss housing, transportation, and more about daily French life. They will practice using expressions with verbs like "aller" (to go) and "venir" (to come), use numbers 100 – 1000 in the context of exploring and describing shops and markets in their towns and around francophone Europe. Lastly, they will explore how to describe the weather and seasons in francophone Europe.



CVA Work Policy

- All classwork must be completed and submitted using the links in CTLS by the DUE DATE listed on the Class Schedule.
- Work should be completed in the order it is assigned on the Class Schedule.
- All work submitted on time will be graded within 48 hours.
- Assignments not submitted by the due date will be marked missing. Missing assignments are calculated as zeros in the coursework average. When students submit missing work, the assignment will be graded and calculated into the coursework average.

- The Cobb Teaching and Learning System (CTLS) is the platform used to deliver Cobb Virtual Academy classes.
- Students must earn 100% on the Student Orientation Quiz located inside each CVA Digital Classroom before they begin their Student Coursework.
