CVA Latin 1 Syllabus

Class Description



This Latin I class introduces students to the history and culture of ancient

Rome and its impact on the modern cultures of today's world. Through a study of Latin grammar and vocabulary, students learn to comprehend and translate the Latin language both for the sake of itself and as a means to improve their abilities in the English language. Through the reading selections and discussions, students learn about the daily lives of the Romans and make comparisons relevant to today's society. Although students do not conduct face-to-face conversations in Latin, they may use Latin orally to initiate and respond to simple statements and commands, as well as read Latin aloud. Elementary writing tasks in the target language also build a bridge to understanding the written word.

This course has three sections: Section A is the first half of the class and includes Units 1-4. Section B is the second half of the class and includes Units 5-7. Section Y is the entire class and includes Units 1-7.

Class Outline

Unit 1: When in Rome

Students will learn to recognize and use Latin cognates, Latin derivatives, and master the basics of Latin greetings and pronunciation. They will learn about the Latin nominative and accusative noun cases and understand noun-verb agreement. The course will also cover sentence structure and composition, translating from English to Latin word order, and the 1st noun declension. In addition to language skills, students will explore the history and culture of ancient Rome, including the Olympian gods, the Via Sacra, the origins of Rome, and the works of the Roman poet Ovid.

Unit 2: Roman History

Students will learn to recognize and use Latin personal pronouns, 1st and 2nd person verbs (with the appropriate pronouns) and understand how verb endings supply the subject of a sentence. They will compose Latin sentences, focusing on subject and verb agreement, explore the 2nd Declension (both masculine and neuter nouns), identify noun declensions in context, and practice translating sentences that include prepositional phrases. Additionally, they will learn a brief history of Rome that spans the Monarchy, Republic, Empire and fall of Rome and includes the 7 kings and notable Romans in each period. Lastly, the myths of Neptune and his Sea monsters, and the demigod Triton.

Unit 3: The Hero's Journey

Students will learn the 1st and 2nd Declension Adjectives and how to use them with nouns. They'll dive into 3rd Conjugation verbs, including -io verbs, and 4th Conjugation verbs, the irregular verb *possum*, and how to use them correctly in context. They will also learn about Genitive nouns, Roman numerals, and cardinal and ordinal numbers in Latin. Additionally, they will learn the stories of Classical heroes (including Roman), the myth of Pluto & Proserpina, and discover customs like Roman funerals and the Hero's quest.

Unit 4: Life in Rome

Students will learn more about Latin grammar, including the uses of the Ablative for place, time, and means, and the Accusative with prepositions and to express duration of time. They will delve into the Dative case, construct Latin sentences with proper noun cases, and explore personal pronouns and prefixes. Additionally, the course will bring Latin to life through the study of Roman culture, from the Cerealia festival and Roman banquets to the myths of Ceres & Proserpina, and the excitement of gladiators and Roman entertainment.

Unit 5: Nature of Things

Students will learn the imperfect tense verbs and how to use adverbs in their Latin sentences. They'll learn Latin question words and how to ask questions. This unit also introduces the future tense for different verb conjugations and the present tense forms of the irregular verbs *Sum* (to be) and *Possum* (to be able). Students will learn fascinating Roman myths about Vulcan, as well as insights into ancient Roman science, medicine, and engineering marvels.

Unit 6: The Ancient World

Students will learn about 3rd Declension nouns, including masculine/feminine and neuter forms, as well as 3rd Declension adjectives and adverbs. They will practice composing Latin sentences with a focus on 3rd Declension nouns and adjectives. Additionally, students will learn about i-stem nouns, imperative verbs, and how to use the vocative noun case. They will learn about the captivating myths of Minerva and Athena, the wonders of the ancient world, and the influences of Africa, Europe, Asia, and the Middle East on ancient Rome. The course will also explore the legendary City of Troy, the Silk Road, and Rome's lasting impact on the ancient world.

Unit 7: Reviving the Past

Students will learn how to use the pluperfect tense and future perfect tense verbs. They will practice composing Latin sentences using these tenses and review the perfect systems of *sum* and *possum*. They will also learn the exciting and tragic history of the cities of Pompeii and Herculaneum, their art, the eruption of Mt. Vesuvius, and the myths of Bacchus.

- All work submitted on time will be graded within 48 hours.
- Assignments not submitted by the due date will be marked missing. Missing assignments are calculated as zeros in the coursework average. When students submit missing work, the assignment will be graded and calculated into the coursework average.
