Friday Extended Homeroom (Academic Opportunity)



- Every Friday
- Extended homeroom called AO
- Provides students with remediation or enrichment opportunities
- Based on individual needs
- Teachers invite students to attend various sessions during AO

Core Course Placement

- All students are placed in CORE classes using our AC matrix.
- The AC matrix is posted on the HTMS website: (Menu<curricular<advanced content).
- Students with an Individualized
 Education Plan are placed according
 to their plan.

Core Verification Sheets

Early May * Rising 6th Grade Students * Receive in Mail



- Parents cannot request to bump UP to an AC course
- Our goal is to expose as many students as possible to AC courses before moving to High School
- By delivering the forms in May it allows our administrators spring/summer to answer
 questions before the 1st day of school

Connections Course Placement

1st two weeks of school * 6th Grade Students * Rotate through all connectionsl

- Our 6th grade students begin the year ONLY enrolled in 5 CORE courses (1st 5th periods)
- Throughout the 1st two weeks of school, they rotate through all our connections classes
- Primary purpose of deciding which (if any) music programs they wish to join (band, chorus, and/or orchestra)
- Although it is not a requirement, students are highly encouraged to join a music class in 6th grade (over 90% of our students do!)
- Students can join two music classes, but only one instrumental class (example: chorus/band or chorus/orchestra, NOT band/orchestra)
- Joining a music class will NOT interfere with being able to take our non-music connection classes (PE, Health, Project Lead the Way, and Art)

Why ELA and Reading?

Local School decision based on specific student need

ELA

Grammar Writing READING

Reading Stories, Novels, Research Poetry, etc.

Writing Vocabulary

Benefits of Separate Reading Class:

- Vast majority of our 6th grade students already read on 8th grade (or higher!) reading level
- No need to push through 5+ novels during a school year just for the sake of doing it
- Instead? Focus on short stories, approximately 3 novels per year, and then provide students with the skills necessary to become better RESEARCHERS! (#1 skill lacking in 9th grade students when entering HS according to Pope, magnet schools, etc.)
- 2-3 research skills are taught each quarter:
 - Digital citizenship
 - In-text citations
 - How to find useful, helpful sources
 - Marking the text
 - Works cited

Benefits of Separate Reading Class:

Focus on Informational Literacy... rather than just being a good reader.

Offering a separate reading class also allows us to help our struggling readers increase their actual reading and phonics skills necessary to be successful in all academic classes

Note: in 8th grade (due to World Language classes), ELA and reading ARE combined into 1 class (countywide)

Speaking of Reading?

- No required summer reading in East Cobb cluster for middle school students
- Beanstack challenge (with prizes!) will be offered for interested students/families
- Additionally, no required "summer math packet"
- CCSD will send out "summer math opportunities" via
 CTLS later this spring

No Lockers



- Increased instructional time due to shorter class changes
- Increased lunch time (break time, social time) due to shorter class changes
- Dramatically lower discipline numbers coming from hallway incidents
- Increased classroom grades since students always have their belongings

Additional Tips

Homework

- *An hour a night
- *Homework is included in academic average
- *Students receive a planner to record assignments




Communication is KEY!



Dress Code


- Suggested length for shorts, skirts, and dresses is mid-thigh

All students are expected to dress in a manner which demonstrates respect for the learning environment




Cafeteria

- Breakfast is available
- Additional items are available, but not monitored
- Students are supervised by a teacher during lunch
- Extended lunch 35 minutes;
 sits with class
- Eating with your student & outside food



Cell Phones

- Students cannot use cellular phones during the school day
- Phones are available in the front office
- Student cannot use laptops without teacher permission
- If in violation, phones and/or laptops will be taken to front office for parents to pick up. (Note: texting home about not feeling well)



Clinic

- At the start of the year all students will complete a clinic form with contacts
- No beds in clinic
- Students can carry over the counter medication with proper form
- Be aware of growth changes




Bus Routes

- Bus routes posted before school begins
- Check the county website
- Have your child ride the bus the FIRST DAY of school so that they know their bus number and bus procedures.



Absences

- Notes must be turned in within 3 days of returning to school.
- If your child is leaving early, have them bring the note to the front office before school.
- Students do not need to bring in a note for after-school transportation. Please communicate directly with your child (example – staying for a club, driving home with a friend, etc.).
